BOARD OF THE METROPOLITAN SEWERAGE DISTRICT JUNE 10, 2009

1. Call to Order and Roll Call:

The regular monthly meeting of the Metropolitan Sewerage District Board and Public Hearing on the budget, rates & fees for FY 2009-2010 was held in the Boardroom of MSD's Administration Building at 2:00 P.M., Wednesday, June 10, 2009. Mr. Aceto presided with the following members present, Bissette, Bryson, Metcalf, Russell, Sobol, and Stanley. Ms. Bellamy, Mr. Creighton, Mr. Haner, Mr. Kelly and Mr. VeHaun were absent.

Others present were: Thomas Hartye, General Manager, William Clarke, General Counsel, Gary McGill with McGill Associates, Leah Karpen with the League of Women Voters, Joseph Martin with Woodfin Sanitary Water & Sewer District, Marcus Jones with Henderson County, James Lewis, Intern with Aceto Law, Ed Bradford, Stan Boyd, John Kiviniemi, Jim Hemphill, Scott Powell, Peter Weed, Angel Banks, Ken Stines, Julie Willingham, Mike Stamey, Rodney Smith and Sondra Honeycutt, MSD.

2. Inquiry as to Conflict of Interest:

Mr. Aceto asked if there were any conflicts of interest with the agenda items. No conflicts were reported.

3. Approval of Minutes of the May 20, 2009 Board Meeting:

Mr. Aceto asked if there were any objections to approving the Minutes of the May 20, 2009 Board Meeting as presented. With no objections, the Minutes were approved by acclamation.

Mr. Clarke presented a summary of the discussions from the Board Retreat of May 8, 2009. Mr. Aceto deferred further discussion on this item to Old Business.

4. Discussion and Adjustment of Agenda:

None

5. Informal Discussion and Public Comment:

Mr. Aceto welcomed Ms. Karpen, Mr. Martin, Mr. Jones and Mr. Lewis.

6. Report of General Manager:

Mr. Hartye presented a scan of a plaque presented to the System Services Division from the City of Asheville Water Department in appreciation for the teamwork displayed, particularly on the Merrimon Avenue emergency job a month a go. He presented a letter from Linda Snyder commending James Beaver for excellent and professional service and an email account of a phone message received from Katy Cramer expressing appreciation for the good work of Ricky Bates from System Services.

In response to Board interest, Mr. Hartye presented a synopsis of the industry associations, their web addresses as well as some general information regarding the more frequented conference offerings, including the WEFTEC Conference to be held in October.

Mr. Hartye presented a copy of the NCLM Legislative Bulletin noting a blurb on Local Government Ethics. Mr. Aceto asked if MSD will be required to revise its Ethics Policy. Mr. Clarke stated that the Local Government Code of Ethics bill has passed the House and is now in the Senate State and Local Government Committee. The bill requires all cities and towns to adopt a code of ethics by resolution or adopted policy. The proposed legislation would require Board Members to complete a minimum of two hours of ethics education within 12 months of election or appointment. Mr. Hartye also presented an article in the WEF Utility Executive on stimulus funding.

Mr. Hartye reported that the Right of Way Committee meeting scheduled for June 24th has been cancelled. The next Regular Board Meeting will be held July 15th at 2PM. Mr. Powell announced that a Finance Committee meeting will be scheduled this month to consider the upcoming Bond Issue.

Mr. Hartye reported that upcoming staff events and meetings include an Industry Workshop with the Pretreatment Section on June 16^{th} at 10 AM, a Plumbers Meeting with System Services Department on July 23^{rd} and, an Employee Appreciation Lunch on July 2^{nd} .

7. Consolidated Motion Agenda:

a. Consideration of Lake Julian Sewer Rehabilitation – ARRA – Resolution of Tentative Award:

Mr. Hartye reported that the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act (ARRA) project located in South Asheville is a combination of two smaller pipe rated projects that are structurally deficient clay lines, and were flagged by the Pipe Rating Program due to the number and severity of defects within the pipe segments. He further reported that the contract was advertised and the following bids were received and opened on May 21, 2009: Iron Mountain Construction Co., with a total bid of \$1,377,124.50; Mendon Pipeline, with a total bid of \$1,150,070.00; Huntley Construction Company with a total bid of \$1,070,930.00; DPI Construction with a total bid of \$895,011.75; Disaster Recovery Group, with a total bid of \$866,597.20; T&K Utilities, Inc. with a total bid of \$799,110.00; Buckeye Construction Co., Inc. with a total bid of \$788,590.55; Spur Construction, LLC with a total bid of \$716,336.00 and Terry Brothers Construction Co., Inc. with a total bid of \$586,692.00. Mr. Hartye stated that staff recommends the Board adopt a Resolution of Tentative Award to Terry Brothers for this project.

b. Consideration of Lake Julian Sewer Rehabilitation – ARRA – Resolution by Governing Body of Applicant:

Mr. Hartye reported that NCDENR requires the Resolution be adopted by the District Board and addresses the following four items: 1. The District accepts the loan and grant offer, 2. The District will adhere to the conditions of the loan and grant, 3. The General Manager is authorized to act on behalf of the District, and 4. The District will adhere to all local, state and federal laws. He stated that NCDENR has directed the District to list the full appropriated offer of \$1,029,600 even though the low bid is about half of this amount. MSD is eligible to add additional work to this project, under limited conditions, up to the full appropriated amount. Staff recommends that the Board adopt the Resolution.

c. Consideration of Lake Julian Sewer Rehabilitation – ARRA – Capital Project Ordinance:

Mr. Hartye reported that the Capital Project Ordinance is for \$1,029,600.00. The final loan/grant amount will be adjusted down to the low bid, plus any additional amount added, via a Promissory Note and a Final Note. Staff recommends that the Board adopt the Capital Project Ordinance for this project.

d. Cash Commitment/Investment Report – Month Ended April 30, 2009:

Mr. Powell reported that the average rate of return for all investments is 2.919%, and currently MSD has \$37.5 million, of which \$11.8 million is designated for future capital outlays. He stated that of the \$8.4 million construction fund, \$4.5 million is for the Microscreen project delayed until the upcoming fiscal year. The District currently has \$22 million in Certificate of Deposits, \$9 million in NCCMT money market accounts, and \$6 million in 3 government agency fixed income investment instruments. He further stated that MSD has a weighted average maturity in its investment portfolio; yield to maturity is at 2.53%. The Series 2008A Synthetic Fixed Rate Bonds are performing in line with what was budgeted, and the 2008B Variable Rate Bonds are performing better than budgeted due to interest rates. Mr. Powell further reported that in a conversation with Robert Hobson with Bank of America, MSD's termination fee for the swap is at \$2 million. In April the termination fee was at \$4 million. He explained the difference in these numbers is due to treasury bonds going up from 3.4% to 3.9%.

Mr. Bissette moved that the Board adopt the Consolidated Motion Agenda as presented. Mr. Stanley seconded the motion. Mr. Sobol asked if the stimulus money can be used for right of way compensation on the Long Shoals Road portion of the Lake Julian project. Mr. Bradford stated that per federal guidelines, MSD cannot be reimbursed for right of way compensation. With no further discussion, Mr. Aceto called for the question. Roll call vote was as follows: 7 Ayes; 0 Nays.

8. Public Hearing – Consideration of Resolution Adopting the Final Budget and Rates and Fees for Fiscal Year 2009-2010:

MINUTES OF PUBLIC HEARING

At 2:27 PM, Mr. Aceto declared the Public Hearing open on the Budget, Rates & Fees for Fiscal Year 2009-2010.

Mr. Hartye presented the Resolution adopting the Final Budget and Rates and Fees for Fiscal Year 2009-2010. In addition, he presented the final budget book, which includes goals and objectives, accomplishments, performance figures, along with the information included in the Preliminary Budget. He stated that the public hearing was being held a week early since the budget must be adopted prior to June 15th deadline and that there are no changes from the preliminary to the final budget. Ms. Karpen asked if the budget hearing was advertised. Mr. Hartye said yes. Mr. Clarke stated the Board is only required to hold a public hearing if a certain percentage of its bond holders ask for it. No bond holders requested a hearing, but the Board has traditionally held a public hearing at its June meeting.

Mr. Aceto called for public comment on the proposed Budget, Rates & Fees for Fiscal Year 2009-2010. With no comment, Mr. Aceto declared the public hearing closed at 2:32 PM.

Mr. Aceto called for a motion to approve the Resolution adopting the Final Budget, Rates & Fees for FY 2009-2010. Mr. Bissette moved that the Board adopt the FY 2009-2010 budget, rates & fees as presented. Mr. Stanley seconded the motion. With no discussion, Mr. Aceto called for the question. Roll call vote was as follows: 7 Ayes; 0 Nays.

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9. Old Business:

Regarding the Retreat Minutes, Mr. Aceto stated that from this document he, Mr. Clarke and Mr. Hartye will develop a series of Board Goals & Objectives that will be directed to the appropriate Board Committees.

10. New Business:

Mr. Bryson asked what the transfer is to the insurance account on the budget. Mr. Powell stated that this is the amount the Board agreed to pay for MSD's health insurance plan in 2009/2010, which was endorsed by the Personnel and Finance Committees. He explained that this is the employer contribution, and the reason it shows as a transfer is because the insurance funds are internal service funds, and the Budget Resolution is a legal documents that shows the outflow and inflow of funds.

11. Adjournment:

With no further business, Mr. Aceto called for adjournment at 2:45 PM.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

BOARD OF THE METROPOLITAN SEWERAGE DISTRICT MAY 20, 2009

1. Call to Order and Roll Call:

The regular monthly meeting of the Metropolitan Sewerage District Board was held in the Boardroom of MSD's Administration Building at 2:00 P.M., Wednesday, May 20, 2009. Mr. Aceto presided with the following members present: Bellamy, Bissette, Bryson, Creighton, Haner, Kelly, Metcalf, Sobol and VeHaun. Mr. Stanley and Mr. Russell were absent.

Others present were: Thomas Hartye, General Manager, William Clarke, General Counsel, Gary McGill with McGill Associates, Leah Karpen with the League of Women Voters, Joseph Martin with Woodfin Sanitary Water & Sewer District, Ed Bradford, Dennis Lance, Jim Hemphill, Scott Powell, Peter Weed, Angel Banks, Ken Stines, Kevin Johnson, Monty Payne, and Sondra Honeycutt, MSD.

2. Inquiry as to Conflict of Interest:

Mr. Aceto asked if there were any conflicts of interest with the agenda items. No conflicts were reported.

3. Approval of Minutes of the April 15, 2009 Board Meeting:

Mr. Aceto asked if there were any objections to approving the Minutes of the April 15, 2009 Board Meeting as presented. With no objections, the Minutes were approved by acclamation.

4. Discussion and Adjustment of Agenda:

None

5. Informal Discussion and Public Comment:

Mr. Aceto welcomed Ms. Karpen and Mr. Martin.

6. Report of General Manager:

Mr. Hartye reported the District opened a satellite office at the Buncombe County Building Permits office at 30 Valley Street in October 2008. The County requested this to facilitate a one-stop location for County issued building permits. He stated that Cecilia Cardascio, who has worked as a connections coordinator for about eight years was assigned to the site with access via internet to the MSD database and mapping. He further stated that both the County and MSD have only positive comments about the satellite facility, and the facility has been very well received by those getting permits. The City Building Permits office is only a short distance away and the Satellite Office has facilitated interaction with them as well. The District considers this endeavor a success and intends to continue providing this service.

Mr. Hartye presented two notification letters from NCDENR regarding the approval of stimulus funds for the Lake Julian sewer rehabilitation project. This project is currently out to bid and staff will bring an award recommendation to the June Board meeting. He stated that the preliminary estimate for the project is \$1,029,600. The project is eligible for a 50% loan (0% interest @ 20 years) and 50% principal forgiveness. He expressed his appreciation to Ed Bradford, Mike Stamey, Roger Watson, Shaun Armistead, Sharon Walk and Teresa Gilbert for putting together the 400 plus pages of application materials for this effort.

Mr. Hartye presented articles from Southern City on a Blue Ribbon Committee concerning bond insurance, an AC-T article on Mountain Building Panel, a Mountain Express article on Tupelo Honey back-up, and an AC-T article on the same back-up.

Mr. Hartye reported that the next regular Board Meeting and Public Hearing on the Budget for FY2009-2010 will be held June 10th at 2PM. The May 27th Right of Way Committee meeting has been cancelled and will meet again June 24th at 9AM. A Finance Committee meeting will be scheduled sometime in June for a potential new bond issue.

7. **Report of Committees:**

Personnel Committee

Mr. VeHaun reported the Personnel Committee met April 29, 2009 to hear a presentation by Mr. Hemphill on Human Resource activities. Mr. Hemphill presented a chart showing MSD's turnover rate of 1% during the last year, and presented information regarding MSD's Wellness program; future programs such as an increase of "3 Streams Medical Services", spousal buyout of MSD's insurance plan, walking program and tobacco cessation. He also provided information about "Succession Planning" and gave an overview of various employee relations activities. With regard to the Cost of Living/Merit Pay Plan, Mr. VeHaun reported that staff is not asking for an increase this year, but is asking for a 16.5% (\$215,000) full funding of the health insurance plan. Following consideration of staff's request, the Personnel Committee recommends the Board approve 16.5% full funding for increases in claim liabilities and fees.

<u>CIP Committee</u>

Mr. Sobol reported the CIP Committee met April 30, 2009, which was well attended by Board Members and representatives from the various municipalities. He stated that Mr. Bradford gave an interesting presentation on the highlights of the current and proposed Capital Improvement Program, highlighting the significant progress made over the last 10 years in the reduction of SSO's; from a high of 288 in FY 2000 to a low of 41 in FY 2008. Also, Mr. Hartye gave a status report on Reimbursement Projects, and Mr. Bradford discussed MSD's rehabilitation program priorities and review of the 10-year CIP document. Mr. Sobol further reported that the CIP Committee endorsed the Capital Improvement Program Budget of \$20,432.008 for FY 2010.

Finance Committee

Mr. Kelly reported that the Finance Committee met May 5, 2009. A presentation was given by Mr. Cole of Davenport and Co., LLC on Capital Funding Options along with reports by Scott Powell on Third Quarter Budget to Actual Review, Self-Insured Health Plan Nine Month Report, Third Quarter City of Asheville Billing Report, proposed FY09-10 Budget and Sewer Rates and Fees, and Standby Purchase Agreement. Mr. Kelly further reported that the Committee endorsed the recommendation of the Personnel Committee for a 16.5% (\$215,000) full funding for insurance plan increases, endorsement of the \$43,128,912 budget for FY09-10 and 3.75% rate increase, and adopted the proposed Standby Bond Purchase Agreement.

8. Consolidated Motion Agenda:

a. Consideration of Developer Constructed Sewer Systems: Creekside Village; Little Beaver Day Care (North); Gorilla Express Car Wash and Northridge Commons Phase 1, 11 and 111:

Mr. Hartye reported that staff recommends acceptance of the Developer Constructed Sewer Systems. All MSD requirements have been met.

b. Consideration of Self-Insured Health Plan and Cost of Living/Merit Pay Plan:

Mr. Hartye reported that Staff and the Personnel Committee recommend approval of a 16.5% full funding of the Self-Insured Health Plan increase in the amount of \$215,000 and no Cost of Living/Merit salary increase.

c. Third Quarter Budget to Actual Review:

Mr. Hartye reported that on the Revenue side, Domestic User Fees are slightly below 75% due to a reduction in residential consumption as well as signs of recessionary constraints on commercial usage. On the expenditures side, the CIP is less due to delay of the Microscreen project.

d. Third Quarter City of Asheville Billing Report:

Mr. Hartye reported that consumption data shows a decrease of nearly 2.5%, which is attributed to a reduction in residential consumption.

e. Standby Bond Purchase Agreement:

Mr. Hartye reported that the Standby Bond Purchase Agreement is for the 2008A and 2008B Series bonds. He stated that this is an agreement with a third party, typically a bank, in which the bank agrees to purchase variable rate bonds tendered for purchase in the event the bonds cannot be remarketed. He further reported that staff obtained informal quotes from three (3) banking institutions, Wachovia (Wells Fargo), BB&T and Bank of America. As a result, staff recommends and the Finance Committee endorses the renewal of the existing Standby Bond Purchase Agreement with Bank of America for a period of two years at a cost not to exceed \$250,000 per year.

f. Cash Commitment/Investment Report – Month Ended March 31, 2009.

Mr. Hartye called on Mr. Powell for a report. Mr. Powell reported that as of the end of March, the District had \$37,397,432. He noted that the amount committed for Construction Funds (9,645,307) does include the \$5 million for the Microscreen Project that was delayed until the next fiscal year. Regarding Investment Performance, Mr. Powell reported that the Weighted Average Maturity is about 211 days, meaning that most of MSD's investments are within a 211 day period. However, there is one CD that is in excess of one year, which is 365 days. He further reported the average rate of return is about 2.53% and that four years ago, two benchmarks were set; a 6 Month T-Bill and a NCCMT Cash Portfolio, and as shown, the yield to maturity is in excess of both benchmarks. Mr. Powell presented graphs showing the performance history of both the Series 2008A Synthetic Fixed Rate Bonds and the 2008B Variable Rate Bonds. He reported that MSD is on target as it pertains to the 2008A and the 2008B Series are well below the 4% budget due to the economics of the variable rate market. He stated that April showed a .51% expenditure and during the last two weeks the bonds have reset at .40%, which means it is good to be in the variable rate market now as it pertains to cash outflow to MSD in relation to debt service. With regard to synthetic fixed rates, Mr. Sobol asked what would happen if Bank of America suddenly went under. Mr. Powell stated that as far as the swap is concerned, the swap does have outs for MSD, and if Bank of America goes under and there are no remedies to MSD, then MSD would be at the mercy of the variable rate market. Mr. Clarke stated that if MSD defaulted on the liquidity agreement, MSD would not have an obligation to pay Bank of America; it would just have to replace the agreement.

Ms. Bellamy moved that the Board adopt the Consolidated Motion Agenda as presented. Mr. Kelly seconded the motion. With no discussion, Mr. Aceto called for the question. Roll call vote was as follows: 10 Ayes; 0 Nays.

9. Consideration of Adoption of the Preliminary Budget for FY 2009-2010 and Schedule of Sewer Rates & Fees:

Mr. Powell reported the Preliminary Budget is \$43,128,912 and consists of a \$20.4 million CIP, \$8.5 million Debt Service, \$13.3 million Operations and Maintenance, which includes the \$215,000 increase in funding of the self-insurance health plan, and \$806,755 for Capital Equipment, which is higher than last year due to the replacement of a pumper truck in the coming year. He further reported that the Budget includes a proposed 3.75% rate increase, but Facility and Tap fees will remain at FY09 levels. He stated that MSD is staying with its 20-year Industrial Parity Plan, which has a 4.3% increase in industrial revenues. Mr. VeHaun asked what kind of problems, if any, would a delay in the rate increase cause. Mr. Powell stated that a delay would have a significant impact on the debt coverage ratio; doubling the rate increase for the next fiscal year and beyond. Mr. Hartye stated that MSD is looking to go out for a new bond issue, and typically the rating agencies look at consistency in a business plan and there would be some explaining to do if there was a zero rate increase and MSD went out for new money as well. Mr. VeHaun asked how much the monthly increase will be. Mr. Hartye said .85¢ per month for the average residential customer. Ms. Bellamy stated that a combination of water and sewer would be approximately \$2.00 per month. Mr. Kelly moved that the Board adopt the Preliminary Budget for FY2009-2010 and the Schedule of Sewer Rates and Fees as presented by staff and endorsed by the Finance Committee. Mr. Creighton seconded the motion. With no discussion, Mr. Aceto called for the question. Roll call vote was as follows: 10 Ayes; 0 Nays.

10. Old Business:

Mr. Aceto asked if a summary of the Retreat was available. Mr. Clarke stated that a report will be available prior to the next Board meeting.

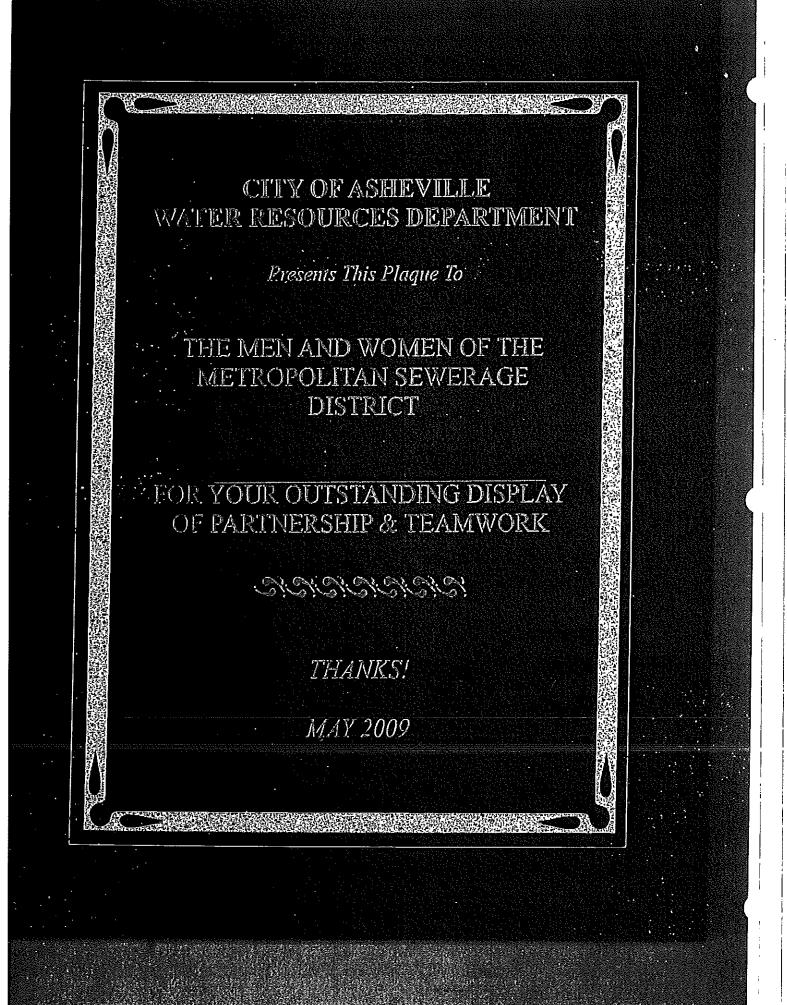

Congratulations to Senator Dan Blue

Broadband Study Bill to be heard in House Public Utilities Wednesday

SB 1004 – The "Level Playing Field" Broadband Bill, which has passed the Senate, will be heard in House Public Utilities Committee next Wednesday. Currently, SB 1004 calls for a study of local government owned and operated communications services, including a comparison of communications services by private providers. We will continue to follow this issue very closely.

Cities can object to location of ABC Stores (on 2009 League Advocacy Agenda)

The Senate has approved HB 186 -- Local Government Objections to ABC Stores. This bill, now approved by both bodies, prohibits a local ABC board from locating an ABC store in a municipality if the municipality adopts a resolution objecting to the location that is based on information and evidence presented to governing board at a public hearing. The ABC board, however, may ask the state ABC Commission to approve the location despite the municipality's objection.

Local government ethics

The House has approved HB 1452 - Local Government Code of Ethics, and the bill is now in the Senate State and Local Government Committee. The bill requires all cities and towns to adopt a code of ethics by resolution or adopted policy and specifies what items are to be addressed in the policy or resolution. All elected municipal officials would be required to complete a minimum of two hours of ethics education within 12 months of election or appointment. The requirements would also apply to counties, local boards of education, unified governments and sanitary districts.

Public financing of municipal campaigns

> HB 120 --Public Municipal Campaigns, which has passed the House, will be considered by the Senate next week (on calendar for May 27). The bill establishes a pilot program for publicly financed municipal election campaigns. It would apply to the Town of Chapel Hill and any municipality above 50,000 in population that request to participate and are selected by the State Board of Elections.

Heard in the legislative halls

We thank John Gray and Lexington citizens for coming to Raleigh May 13 to support fairness in annexation. Their contacts with 14 legislators made a very strong case for reasonable annexation policy. We appreciate their time and support.

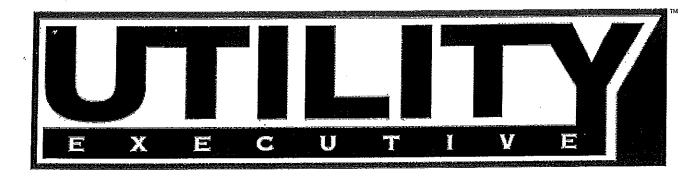
Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) deadlines:

Notice of information regarding applications for the State's non-entitlement CDBG funding was released this week by the N.C. Department of Commerce's Division of Community Assistance (DCA). The State received \$12 million in ARRA funding. Application information will be made available on the DCA website May 29, 2009 at www.nccommerce.com/en/CommunityServices. Applications will be due to DCA on June 12, 2009 at 5:00 p.m.

Due to the short turn-around time on these non-entitlement CDBG applications, the League urges non-entitlement cities to revisit prior unfunded applications for submission, noting whether those projects fit ARRA criteria. DCA encourages applications that would fund (1) infrastructure providing basic services to residents or (2) activities promoting energy efficiency through rehabilitation or retrofitting of existing buildings. DCA has proposed to allocate \$3 million of its allocation for housing, \$5.87 million for infrastructure, \$2 million for special projects, and the remainder for administrative cost.

Water/sewer program deadlines

Water and sewer program applicants whose projects appeared on the State of North Carolina's Intended Use Plan (IUP) and did not receive funding in the first round of ARRA funding awards have until June 3, 2009 to submit their full applications to the N.C. Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR). Two programs received ARRA funding: the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund and the Clean Water State Revolving Fund. In February, both programs solicited projects to be listed on the IUP. Only projects listed on the State IUP are eligible for funding, and only after applicants submit a full application to DENR.



Can We All Get Along?

Using a technical advisory group to avoid conflict in POTW expansions Carl F. Fischer, Pavel Hajda, and Steven G. Zehner

P ublicly owned treated works (POTWs) and environmental advocacy groups share a common goal: protection of the environment. While environmental advocacy groups would like to see faster progress in water quality improvements, POTW owners are trying to do as much as they can with limited financial resources. Sometimes this obligation to be fiscally responsible makes POTW owners appear — in the eyes of the environmental advocacy groups — to be against water quality improvements.

Forming a technical advisory group (TAG) can be a way for POTWs to work with stakeholders, such as advocacy groups, to formulate a mutually acceptable plan to expand. In Illinois, this approach has been used successfully on several projects. In one, the Village of Itasca formed a TAG to work with these groups to take a holistic approach to improving water quality. They developed an environmentally sound plan in which the expansion of the wastewater treatment plant was only one component. The plan includes stormwater management measures that are targeted to improve water quality in Salt Creek and its tributary, Spring Brook. It also includes measures to require new housing and commercial developments to employ stormwater best management practices and conservation design techniques to further protect the quality of Itasca's waterways.

Water Environment Federation the water quality people* The experience at Itasca was a good one for both parties. Utility managers were left with more admiration for what the environmental advocacy groups were trying to accomplish, and the groups seemed to share mutual respect.

Stimulus Funding Prompts Stiff Competition for SRF Funds

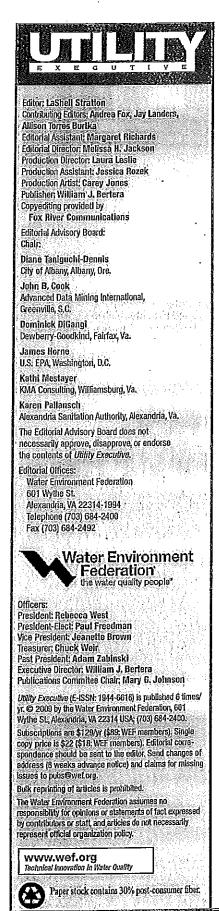
E nacted Feb. 17 by President Barack Obama, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) provides a historic boost in federal funding for water and wastewater infrastructure. Yet as states prepare to disburse the stimulus funding in a timely manner as prescribed by the law, the financial needs of water and wastewater agencies substantially dwarf the funds allocated by the act. As a result, agencies are scrambling to comply with what in some cases are stringent deadlines for requesting funding from State Revolving Fund (SRF) programs.

ARRA appropriated \$4 billion for the Clean Water SRF and \$2 billion for the Drinking Water SRF. Of these amounts, the states administering the SRF programs must allocate at least half for subsidization, either in the form of grants, forgiveness of principal, negative interest loans, or a combination of these.

Expected Growth in Itasca

The village of Itasca is located in DuPage County, about 40 km (25 mi) northwest of Chicago. The region is anticipating major growth, especially with the expansion of O'Hare International Airport. As part of that project, the Elgin–O'Hare Expressway will be extended to the airport to provide for the first time a direct access from the west, which is expected to lead to significant increases in residential population and commercial employment.

To prepare for the anticipated development, Itasca initially set out to expand its 9800-m3/d (2.6-mgd) POTW. But when the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) announced that it was developing total maximum daily loads (TMDLs) for dissolved oxygen in Salt Creek, the receiving stream, and the nearby east branch of the DuPage River, Itasca postponed its expansion project. It took 6 years for IEPA to prepare the TMDLs, during which time Itasca started having second thoughts about its original plan. Itasca began to question the wisdom of investing in a site that is too small, has floodplain issues, and is in close proximity to residents who objected to the plant's noise and odor. After reviewing several alternatives, the village decided to relocate the POTW to a new site.

In August 2006, Itasca began preparation of a facility plan amendment, which was tentatively approved by IEPA in May 2008. At press time, IEPA is expected to issue its formal approval of the amendment in the second quarter of 2009.

How the Antidegradation Rule Changed Things

Until the late 1990s, a POTW owner in Illinois typically did not confer with third-party stakeholders about plans to expand. The POTW owner usually submitted a facility plan to IEPA, along with an application for a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit modification. It was not until the public notice period of the draft permit that the POTW owner communicated with third-party stakeholders. Even then, it was only if the stakeholders filed an objection or requested a public hearing and comments were submitted within the public notice period.

The adoption of the state's 2002 Anti-Degradation Rule changed this. The rule requires IEPA to conduct an antidegradation assessment of any proposed increase in pollutant loading on a receiving stream from any new or existing point source discharge. The assessment must demonstrate that the discharge will not degrade water quality below existing water quality standards or, if it does, the increased discharge must be justified by an overriding socioeconomic benefit.

Soon after the rule's passage, more third-party comments on draft NPDES permits were received and became well coordinated. In particular, they pressured

cooperative attitude changed the owners' opinions of the environmental advocacy groups, who became allies, rather than opponents.

The results of the TAG process verified this. The environmental advocacy groups were reasonable and rational. They were truly helpful in formulating a plan that provided additional environmental benefits at an affordable price. The village concluded that the added benefits would enhance the quality of life in Itasca and were well worth the 6% increase in cost for the alternatives.

Additionally, 20% of the funding must go toward "green" infrastructure projects, improvements to boost water or energy efficiency, or other environmentally innovative activities. Ultimately, projects receiving SRF money from ARRA that are not under construction or contract within 1 year of the law's enactment will lose their funding. Lending even more urgency to the process, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency recommends that states select projects that are likely to begin construction by June 17.

When Needs Exceed the Funding

Though large by historical standards, the new funding for the SRF programs pales in comparison to the identified needs of water and wastewater utilities around the country. As Congress debated ARRA, The U.S. Conference of Mayors (Washington, D.C.) on Jan. 17 identified thousands of "ready-to-go" infrastructure projects across the nation, including more than 4000 water and wastewater infrastructure projects valued at approximately \$23.5 billion.

To use one municipality as an example, the Philadelphia Water Department has identified 74 "shovel-ready" water and wastewater projects worth a combined total of \$202 million, said John DiGiulio, a department spokesman. Yet the entire state of Pennsylvania is scheduled to receive \$221 million in SRF funding from ARRA.

Agencies Face Stiff Competition

Pent-up demand for funding is prompting stiff competition for ARRA's SRF funds. This is certainly the case in Indiana, which is slated to receive roughly \$94 million for its Clean Water SRF and \$27 million for its Drinking Water SRF. Indiana communities were

required to apply for a share of the state's extra SRF funds by Feb. 27. Preliminary engineering reports were due to the Indiana Finance Authority the body that oversees the state's SRF program — by mid-March. "It's a very rushed and compact timeline," said Bill McElhaney, director of Marion (Ind.) Municipal Utilities.

Marion Municipal Utilities is seeking funding to replace lime-slaking units at its 45,420-m3/d (12-mgd) drinking water facility and a booster pump station on its distribution system, as well as for efforts to address combined-sewer overflows (CSOs). The lime-slaking units and the pump station each carry an estimated price tag of \$500,000, McElhaney said. The collection system improvements, however, will cost much more. At press time, the agency was in the process of finalizing an estimated \$95 million plan for addressing CSOs. The agency is seeking SRF funding to help finance a \$5.5 million project involving sewer separation and the construction of additional storage in the collection system - two elements of the plan.

For Marion Municipal Utilities, the prospect of receiving ARRA funding is all the more urgent in light of recent economic hardships faced by its community. Marion has fallen on tough economic times as factories have closed, unemployment has increased, and the city's population has declined roughly 10% during the past decade to about 30,000. Yet heavy competition for the new SRF funding dampens the agency's expectations.

For starters, any funding received by the agency is almost certain to be in the form of loans, rather than grants, McElhaney said. Despite its recent economic difficulties, Marion is not expected to qualify for grants under Indiana's SRF program, because the monthly rates

paid by the agency's customers are likely to be below the state's threshold for determining who is eligible for grants.

"It just doesn't appear that we're going to get much" of the new SRF funding, McElhaney said. "We don't hold out much hope."

When Green May Be Golden

Indiana, of course, is not the only state in which competition for new SRF funding is fierce. In Washington state, which is expected to receive \$68.2 million for its Clean Water SRF and \$41.8 million for its Drinking Water SRF, utilities have had to consider their options carefully as they determine for which projects they will seek funding, said Dave White, strategic policy planner in the wastewater treatment division of the King County (Wash.) Department of Natural Resources and Parks. Such caution has been particularly important for agencies considering whether to seek stimulus funding for projects that are not already on the SRF request list

maintained by the Washington State Department of Ecology, the agency that administers the state's SRF program.

Entities applying for SRF funding must comply with multiple prerequisites pertaining to such matters as environmental reviews and facility plans, White said. Because agencies were given only a few weeks to submit additional project applications to Washington's SRF program, conducting these tasks within such a short period proved difficult. "It's a fairly rigorous process with a fairly narrow window," White said.

Moreover, the state decided that it would provide grants only to economically disadvantaged areas, effectively denying grants to King County. For these reasons, King County decided not to apply for SRF funding for a traditional wastewater project, White said.

Instead, King County opted to request SRF funding for a project that it believes will qualify as "green infrastructure." The county is pursuing this course because the state may offer subsidized loans for green infrastructure projects, White said. At press time, King County was preparing to apply for SRF funding for a cogeneration project to be constructed at its 503,000-m³/d (133mgd) West Point Treatment Plant. The project would use gas collected from the plant's digesters to power cogeneration engines that would then produce electricity for use onsite or to be sold to an electric utility.

Expected to cost more than \$20 million, the cogeneration project would help King County meet its goal of improving the environment, White said. Because of the historically low cost of energy in the Pacific Northwest, however, the project has been a "close call" economically for the county absent any subsidies, White said. "It's one of those projects that has always been a little bit on the edge as far as penciling out but has many environmental benefits," he said.

Non-SRF Funding

Other federal programs that may benefit water and wastewater agencies also received funding under ARRA. For example, the act provides nearly \$1.4 billion for grants and loans to small communities for water and wastewater projects as part of the Rural Utilities Service program conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Other federal programs receiving funding that potentially could be tapped by water and wastewater agencies include Community Development Block Grants administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grants administered by the U.S. Department of Energy.

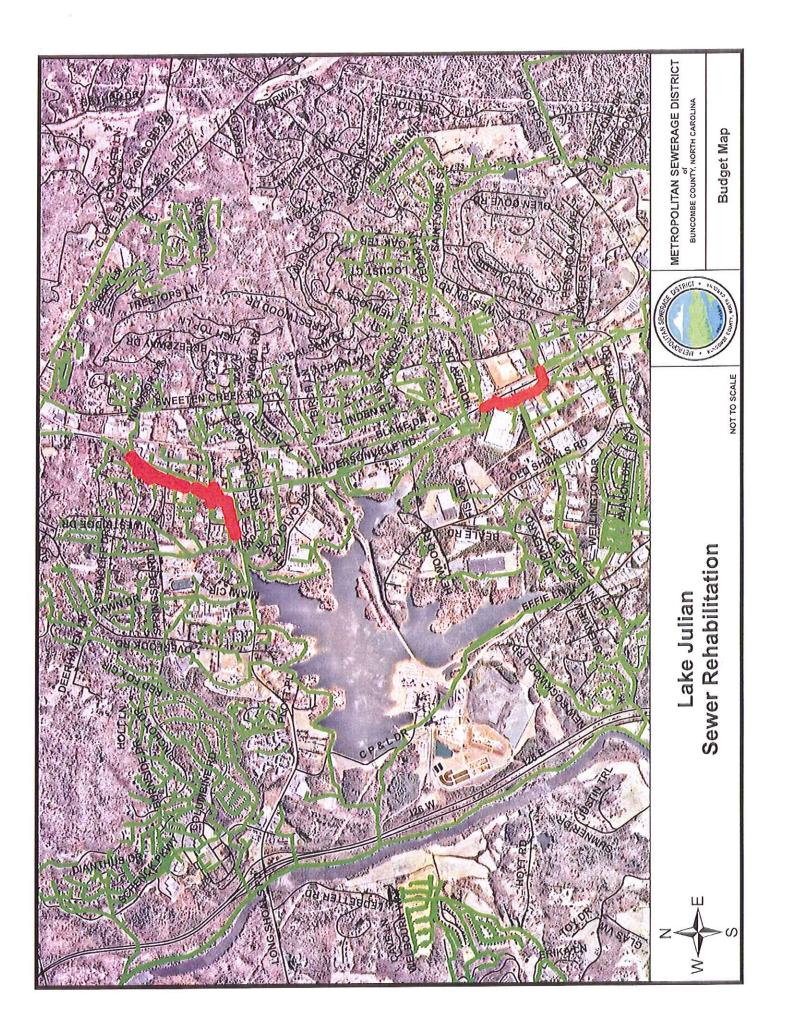

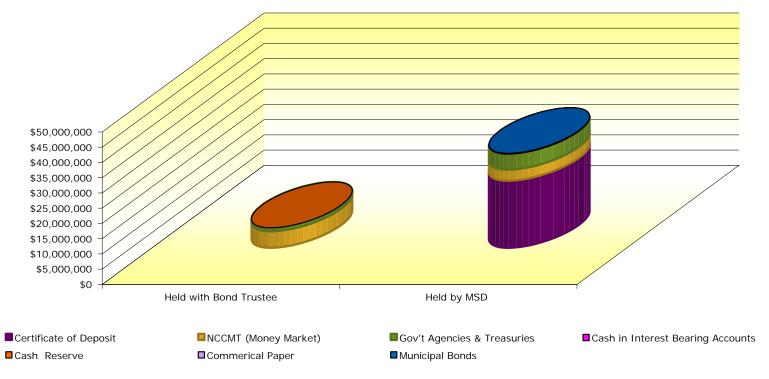

MSD of Buncombe County Investment Portfolio by Location As of April 30, 2009



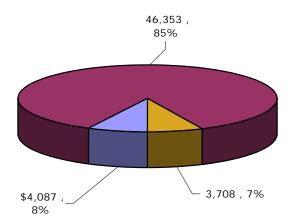

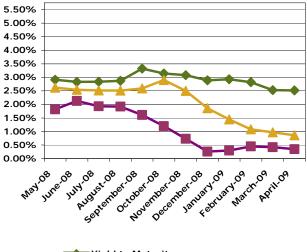

Metropolitan Sewerage District of Buncombe Co. Investment Portfolio Income by Maturity April 30, 2009



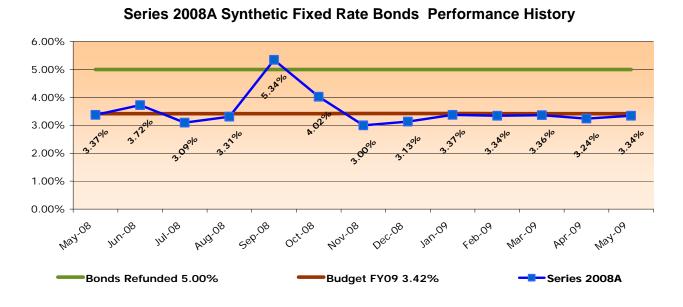

MSD Variable Debt Service Report As of May 31, 2009

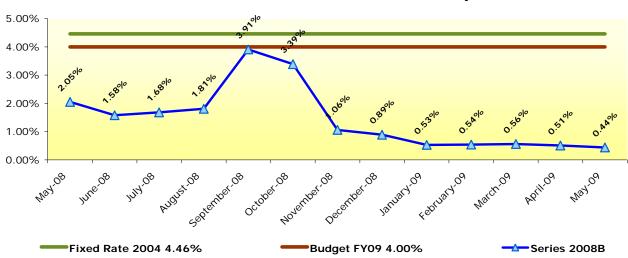

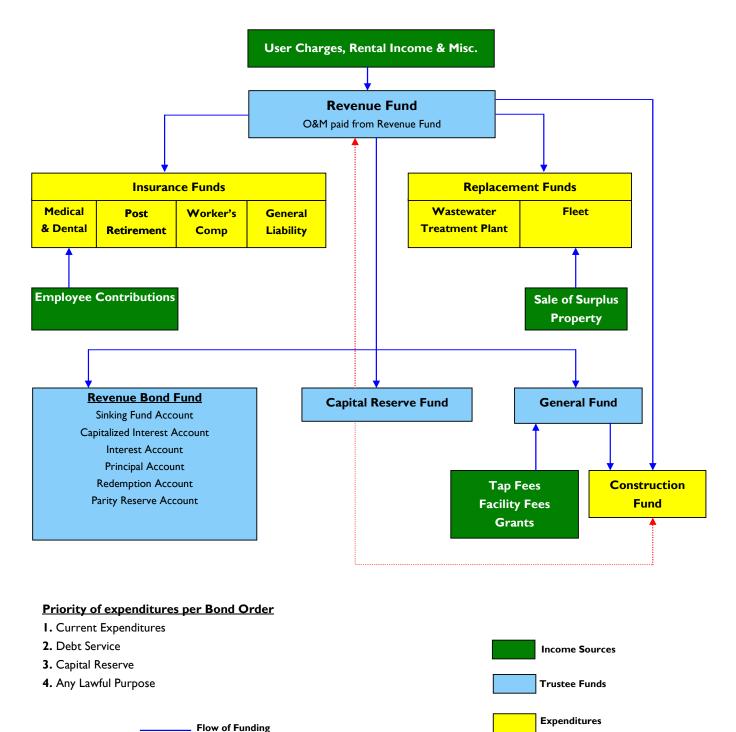
